Hoof Trimming

Earlier this month, Anthony- our Hoof Trimmer, came and trimmed the CREAM string's hooves. Anthony couldn't have come at a better time; we had multiple cows that were showing signs of discomfort in their footing. Some of the more major cases were with 526 (Razmataz) with toe ulcer, white line lension, and sole hemorrhaging on both rear hooves, 496 (Jessemee) with a right rear white line lesion, and 628 (Kona) with a left rear sole ulcer, the three girls were treated using blocking and wraps with cyclohexidine and are doing much better!





On November 14th, The CREAM class was given a presentation by our very own Dr. Pete Erickson. Pete is a professor at UNH and the main coordinator of nutrition research- focusing mainly on calf nutrition at the Fairchild Dairy Facility. The CREAM class is very lucky to have Dr. Erickson as one of our 'mentors'; he sits in on every business meeting and lends his knowledge to all of us. In his discussion Pete lent much more of his knowledge in discussing multiple topics, a few being nutrition of our herd- high producers versus low producers- lactating versus heifer minerals, and 'managing your bunk'. Pete even discussed career goals with us, he recommended keeping an open mind in regards to the future and where it may take each and every one of us. The lesson of keeping an open mind came from experience; Pete was involved in calf research while working toward one of his degrees and he said he absolutely hated it, and was adamant on never working with them again, but now here he is in charge of the nutrition research of the calves and he is loving it!



Mini Lectures

11 CREAMers have already shared their extensive knowledge of some very interesting subjects relating to the cows and what we do at CREAM; those topics have included Hoof Trimming by Jerica, Hairy Heel Warts by Jenna, Mastitis by Bailey, Heifer Feeding by Devan, Cattle Behavior by Megan R., Bovine Spongiform Encephalitis by Emily, Methionine and Lysine by Mark, Corn and Hay Silage by Jake, Choppers by Justin, Leukosis by Lauren, and Milking Procedures by Vilma. These presentations were graded on their creativity, relevance to the CREAM herd, topic depth and scientific accuracy. Fellow CREAMers were encouraged to ask questions at the end of each presentation and the presenters were also graded on their knowledge of the topic in how well they answered the questions. We saw presentations that contained videos, mention and comparison to family farm operations and even presentations that were "Goldie Locks" themed!
